**“Pressure: Race and the Policing of Public Space in 1970s
London”**

Dr. Josh B. Guild specializes in 20th Century African-American history and has focused on urban communities and the making of the modern African diaspora. Dr. Guild is currently working on his book comparing black communities in central Brooklyn, where there were large numbers of Caribbean immigrants interacting with African-Americans, to the Notting Hill area of west London where there was an influx of Caribbean Immigrants interacting with native Britons.

“Pressure: Race and the Policing of Public Space in 1970s London” considers a series of conflicts between the Metropolitan Police and the black community in Notting Hill. Set in the context of the rise of black power, in Britain and globally, the lecture describes how ostensibly local tensions over public space and public order in the metropolis had national ramifications.
